John Cameron Swayze Board Game

ohn Cameron Swayze began his broadcast career hosting a radio show called *Who Said That*? But he is best remembered for the years he was the anchor for a 15-minute evening television news program called *The Camel News Caravan* on NBC.

In 1955 R. J. Reynolds, maker of Camel cigarettes, reduced its sponsorship to three nights per week, with *The Plymouth News Caravan* airing on the other two evenings. When Swayze's ratings began to slip in 1956, his news program was replaced by *The Huntley-Brinkley Report*, which soon became the nation's top-rated TV newscast. Remembering Swayze, newscasters David Brinkley and Walter Cronkite praised him for being able to recite the evening news cogently without using a script. Swayze later was the host of TV's *Armstrong Circle Theater*.

Whenever there was a popular radio or TV show, there was a good chance that a game manufacturer would create a new game on that theme. The Museum currently exhibits TV show board games for programs like *I Love Lucy, Charlie's Angels*, and the quiz show *Twenty One*. A recent artifact showcase featured a Fibber McGee and Molly radio show game. This 1954 news quiz board game from game manufacturer Milton Bradley featured a board with a large map of the world, divided into sectors. Players would use a spinner to select a sector of the world, and then the moderator would ask a news-related question from that sector.
